

Quick Start

- Get the latest versions of Galleria and jQuery or use a [cdn \(/article/15-beginners-guide#cdn\)](#)
- Place the galleria folder and additional themes in your project
- Include jQuery and Galleria on your web page and check the path to your theme

Add data

There are several ways of adding image data to your gallery, but the simplest way is to add some HTML. Just put the images inside any container on the site. You can also add titles and descriptions using data attributed on the IMG tag:

```
<div class="galleria">
  
  HTML</i> description">
</div>
```

If you want separate thumbnails (recommended), just add them as a link:

```
<div class="galleria">
  <a href="/img/large1.jpg">
```

You may also add a separate larger image for fullscreen using the data-big attribute:

```
<div class="galleria">
  <a href="/img/large1.jpg">
```

Adding video from YouTube, Vimeo or Dailymotion is easy – just link an image to the video page. If you want Galleria to fetch a thumbnail, add an element with the class 'video' instead of a thumbnail:

```
<div class="galleria">
  <a href="http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=GCZrz8siv4Q"></a>
  <a href="http://vimeo.com/12309423"><span class="video">Watch this on Vimeo!</span></a>
</div>
```

You can also define the data as a JSON array:

```
<script>
var data = [
  {
    image: 'img1.jpg',
    thumb: 'thumb1.jpg',
    big: 'big1.jpg',
    title: 'my first image',
    description: 'Lorem ipsum caption',
    link: 'http://domain.com'
  },
  {
    video: 'http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=GCZrz8siv4Q',
    title: 'my second image',
    description: 'Another caption'
  }
];
</script>
```

Then just pass this array as the /options(dataSource option. For a more in-depth explanation on how Galleria handles image data, read /references/data.

Activate Galleria

When the data is added, you need to load a theme and activate Galleria. Use the Galleria.loadTheme and then the galleria() function on the selected jQuery object:

```
<script>
(function() {
    Galleria.loadTheme('galleria/themes/classic/galleria.classic.min.js');
    Galleria.run('.galleria');
})();
</script>
```

Adding options

Use the Galleria.configure function to apply global options. You can define an object to apply multiple options, or two arguments (key/value) to apply a single option. Please visit [option list](#) (<http://docs.galleria.io/category/28-option-list>) for a complete list.

Example options:

```
Galleria.configure({
    imageCrop: true,
    transition: 'fade'
});
```

Configuring a single options:

```
Galleria.configure('imageCrop', true);
```

To apply options to a specific instance, use the second argument in Galleria.run, f.ex:

```
Galleria.run('.galleria', {
    theme: 'twelve',
    imageCrop: true
})
```

Optimize Galleria

Using the API

Further customizations can be done using the [api-methods](#) (<http://galleria.helpscoutdocs.com/category/23-methods>) and [api-events](#) (<http://galleria.helpscoutdocs.com/category/22-events>). You'll have access to them using the Galleria.ready function:

```
Galleria.ready(function(options) {  
  
    // 'this' is the gallery instance  
    // 'options' is the gallery options  
  
    this.bind('image', function(e) {  
        Galleria.log('Now viewing ' + e.imageTarget.src);  
    });  
});
```

Another option if you just want to listen to events is using the Galleria.on() function:

```
Galleria.on('image', function(e) {  
    Galleria.log('Now viewing ' + e.imageTarget.src);  
});
```

You can also access the methods inside the `jQuery.data` object of the element you attached the gallery to, f.ex:

```
('.galleria').data('galleria').enterFullscreen();
```
